Juliette Breese-Bennett Relatives Visit

One quiet afternoon near the end of October 2023, two visitors came to the Museum at the Portage - Constance Monroe from Scottsdale, Arizona, and her daughter, Poppi, wished

to tour the house and to seek more information on her "Aunt Juliette Breese" who was adopted by William Llewellyn Breese and his first wife, Jessie (Blackman) Breese.

Coni is Juliette's niece, and Poppi is researching and writing their family history. Until that day, I was not aware that Juliette had siblings and was surprised to learn that she had two sisters - Coni being the daughter of one of them. Sadly, the three sisters were put up for adoption when first their mother, then their father passed away. At that time, their first and last names were changed in the adoption process.

Coni remembers coming to Uncle William & Aunt Jessie's home at a very young age, so it was meaningful to her to once again walk through and recall memories. Her most vivid memory is of sitting in Zona's chair at her desk in the study, though she doesn't have a distinct memory of Zona probably because she had already passed away.

After their visit, I connected a few dots and recalled

that among our collection of five University of Wisconsin yearbooks, we have one belonging to Juliette Breese ("The Wisconsin Badger", Volume 47, copyright 1932; Editor-in-Chief is Jack Thompson; Business Manager is Gerhard Becker). Juliette's name is stamped in the lower right corner of the cover.

Side Note: I learned from my search on the UW Library website that there were two "Wisconsin Badger" yearbooks published in 1932. The other one is Volume 46, published



by the Junior Class of the University of Wisconsin. It has a plain cover which is tan in color and trimmed with black.

In Juliette's yearbook, bears an inscription: "For Juliette Breese from Glenn Frank" under his photo in the Administration section - Glenn Frank was President of the University of Wisconsin at the time.

Juliette's name also appears in the index on page 382 - in the "Campus Groups" section of the yearbook. "Villa Maria" is on that page, beginning with a black & white photo of what seems to be a sitting room with a piano in one corner, a comfy chair, desk, fireplace, and a small table. There are no photographs of the Villa Maria Campus Group members. However, below the featured photo the members are listed

by name - there were two "Officers", a President, and a W.S.G.A. Representative [Women's Student Government Association]. Next is a listing of "Members in University," starting off with graduates - Juliette Breese is one of three ladies listed there. Below that are listed 14 ladies in the Class of 1932; 20 ladies in the Class of 1933; 18 ladies in the Class of 1934; and 17 ladies in the Class of 1935. Not knowing anything about campus groups or Villa Maria, I did a bit of research on the internet. The Wisconsin Historical Society website has a property record for Villa Maria at 615 Howard Place in Madison. It was built in 1926 as a student rooming house/apartment building. Frank Riley of Madison was the architect.

It is a part of the Langdon Street Historic District in Madison and listed on the National Register of Historic Places (June 26, 1986) and the State Register of Historic Places (January 1, 1989). Citation: Wisconsin Historical Society, Wisconsin Architecture and History Inventory, "Villa Maria," City of Madison, Dane County, Wisconsin, Reference Number: 145929.

It was a pleasure to be the docent that afternoon and to meet these two delightful relatives of Juliette Breese. I thanked them for adding to my knowledge of the Breese family who lived in this house back in the day, and I wish them the best as they continue to compile their family histories.

Curator Corner

The Collections Team would like to thank everyone who donated items to the museum this year - 23 items in 2023! Your donations are vital in helping us tell the story of Portage and its residents.

Over the past year, enormous steps were made to improve our collections storage. Volunteers, Debbie Rohrbeck and Sandy Nachreiner, sorted hundreds of objects by type (all the metal items together, all glass bottles together, etc.) and then stored these items in new archival containers.

To make room for metal shelving obtained by the museum, Jim & Mary Gorman and Vicki Vogts removed the two long center rows of old library wood bookcases from the basement. The acidity of the wood shelves and their shallow depth did not allow for safe storage of our collection items. The new

metal shelving created space for larger clothing and textile boxes to be placed in one room which freed up space in another storage room.

Alongside the metal shelving, we added a work table with a photography area (not pictured) and an area for

archival supplies to be stored. Three new dehumidifiers and box fans are set up throughout the basement storage area to keep the environment suitable for long-term storage.

This basement reorganizing project began in February 2023, and less than a year later, we're excited to share that the majority of items that have been sorted can now begin the next step of updating each item's location in our computer system, making our collections more searchable for research and display.

"Portage Families" - Robert & Ada Bain

The Museum at the Portage has an exhibit that will feature a family from the Portage area. The current exhibit focuses on the Robert & Ada Bain family.

In late 2021, Nancy, the granddaughter of Elizabeth (Bain) Seville, donated a 1905 Portage High School diploma belonging to Elizabeth. I obtained more information, items, and photographs from Nancy to create this exhibit.

Elizabeth (Bain) Seville grew up on a farm located in Fort Winnebago on a property they named "Maple Grove Farm". In September, Nancy and her husband, Mike, with two traveling companions came to Portage to see the exhibit and to visit the farm. The current owners of the farm were very gracious in welcoming them into their lovely home and sharing historic items from the

property.





Nancy's grandfather, Frederick Seville, grew up in Lodi, Wisconsin. The owners of his childhood home also opened their doors to the relatives of the people who built this pretty house. The owners noted that many past residents visit their home. Frederick and Elizabeth had a daughter, Jean, who is Nancy's mother.

Nancy and Mike live in California in the house that Frederick & Elizabeth Seville built in 1936. This exhibit all

started with a 1905 Portage High School diploma!
