Brick House with an Interesting History

Local history at its best occurs when a family member, as in the case of Lulu Tanke Fuller, with well-documented photo albums is able to fill in missing information, correct earlier assumptions, and show us copies of Lulu's artwork.

Lulu Tanke was born in 1888, the eldest of four children of August and Mathilde Tanke of Caledonia, Wisconsin. Her father never recovered from a freight car accident in 1895 and died at the age of 34 when Lulu was 8. Mathilde's fourth child was born shortly

thereafter at 730. West Edgewater Street in Portage, where the now impoverished family was able to keep a cow and chickens. Mathilde grew grass along the Wisconsin River and sent the chil-



dren into town to sell the brooms she made from it.

Through a series of legal actions, Royal Fuller (whom Lulu later married) purchased the land adjoining her mother's lot from Mathilde, and titled it back over to Lulu. She is acknowledged to have "preferred the ways of high society" and while visiting an aunt in Illinois had seen and fallen in love with a house she saw there. With a May 1924 mortgage, Lulu started building a house on the 724 lot identical to the one she had fallen in love with in Illinois "down to the last brick". She did not marry Fuller until August 1924.

Zona Gale returned to Portage in 1911 at the age of 37. Although Lulu, who lived down the street was 22, there is only the recollection of their mutual friend,



Hazel Sanderson, that they were indeed friends. The Pulitzer Prize winning "Miss Lulu Bett" was published in 1921 when Lulu Tanke was 32 and beginning her emergence. There remains, however, as with so many of Gale's characters, only a suggestion of a connection to someone in the community.

The economic crash of 1929 came hard on the heels of Lulu's not only having built an extraordinarily expensive new home, but of having furnished it lavishly. Tax arrears appeared by 1928 and two more mortgages ensued.

In 1935, Lulu and Royal's only child, Bobbie, suffered a tragic fall at Durwood's Glen leaving him with multiple compound arm and leg fractures and hospitalized for months. Mounting hospital bills, the country's deepening depression, and the insurmountable



three mortgages against the property forced them into foreclosure in 1936.

Although the foreclosure was on the 724 and 730 homes, the Fullers retained the much neglected 730 home and Zona Gale became the owner of the 724 home. It was after her son's accident that Lulu began

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painting with an irrepressible joy for flowers. Although forced to move back into the house where she had grown up in poverty at 730, Lulu continued to paint for many years. Their telephone listing in 1937 at 730 in view of the house of their dreams was 376-R.

In 1941, T.H. Sanderson & Hazel Sanderson purchased the home at 724 and lived there until Susan Gamble purchased the home in 2003. Susan recently obtained the original abstract for the property and allowed the museum to copy it for our collection. Zona Gale's Will is also printed in the abstract since she owned 724 at the time of her death.


Member Appreciation Night


October 22, 2024 (Tuesday) 5:00 pm - social time 6:00 pm - presentation by Shelley Mordini

Patricia (Neesvig) Madani

Patricia Madani passed away on Monday, July 8, 2024. Patricia was born October 6, 1943, the daughter of Margaret Wilhelmina "Peg" and Burton Oswald "Ted" Neesvig. Pat always liked to draw, write stories, and create art presents for friends and family. She attended Wisconsin High School on the UW campus graduating in 1961, and then graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1965 with a degree in Art Education. She taught elementary and junior high art for seven years in Wichita, Kansas, and in Northlake, Illinois. Pat wrote two books (one about her experiences in Iran and the other, a family cookbook) and a monthly column in a local paper, "The Observer".



On February 24, 1966, she married Manoucher Madani. After living in Iran for two years, the couple moved to Portage where they opened the Trail's Lounge, which they ran for over 47 years. Pat is survived by her husband, Manoucher, and three children: Tahminae Madani, Rodman Madani, and Taranae Madani, son-in-law, Martin Heathcote, and grandson, Arman Heathcote.
