PORTAGE HIGH SCHOOL HALL OF FAME -WINIFRED BAIN

In late September, Dr. Winifred E. Bain (PHS Class of 1909) was inducted into the Portage High School Hall of Fame Class of 2025. Dr. Bain was born in 1889, and raised in the Portage area. Her early education was spent at the Spicer School in Fort Winnebago, and her high school years were completed at the Central High School building in Portage. Dr. Bain decided early in life that she wanted to be a kindergarten teacher. Upon high school graduation, Dr. Bain attended "Normal School" in Whitewater and Milwaukee to become a teacher. She taught kindergarten in Wisconsin and Minnesota after graduating college. Dr. Bain continued her education at the University of Chicago, where she earned a PhD degree in 1924. In 1929, she received her PhD from Columbia University in New York City. Dr. Bain served on the faculty at Radford State College in Radford, Virginia, always concentrating on early education. In 1940, she became president of Wheelock College in Boston (now known as Boston University Wheelock College of Education & Human Development). While president, Dr. Bain transformed the school into a fully-accredited four-year college. After she retired in 1955, Dr. Bain continued to serve the college by being a member of its Board of Trustees. Dr. Bain died in 1965 at the age of 76. The Bain family has been featured in the "Portage Families" exhibit at the museum for the past two years.

MEMBERSHIP APPRECIATION NIGHT HIGHLIGHTS September 18

Robert "Bob" Block gave a presentation on "Wisconsin POW Camps" during World War II. Bob is a resident of Oregon and is an active member of their Historical Society as well as having an interest in historic topics. Bob retired after working with the Wisconsin Crime Lab in Madison for 34 years before retiring as head of the drug identification unit having testified in courts of law over 500 times as an expert witness.

Wisconsin had 38 POW camps housing 20,000 prisoners between 1939-1945. There were POW camps in Cambria, Fox Lake, Markesan, Ripon, Beaver Dam, Green Lake, Reedsburg, Columbus, and Lodi. POWs were treated very well and some even stayed in Wisconsin after being released.

Roberts learned of this from another friend just a week before the event, he emailed an inquiry to the museum, volunteering to "... do a short program reading some of Zona's poetry from The Secret Way, August Derleth's poem Elegy: On a Flake Of Snow and speak briefly on Zona's poetry as it relates to other poets of her time: Edna St. Vincent Millay and Amy Lowell." Tentative plans became fact after James received Jeff's permission.

It was a fine program, and we were treated to quite a surprise ending. James read two poems of his own, paying tribute to Zona Gale and to Margery Latimer. We thank James P. Roberts for this introduction to transcendental poetry from yesteryear's writers. As well, we thank him for stepping in at the last minute to keep the Celebrating Friendship Village Day program from skipping a beat.

SOCIETY HILL HISTORIC DISTRICT WALKING TOUR



CURATOR'S CORNER

After roughly two years of "large scale" organizing in the museum basement, the end is in sight for these larger projects. Over the last two years, several loads of junk, moldy items, and trash have been removed from the basement - creating more usable space for items in the museum's collection. Spaces have also been designated for storage of certain items making it easier to locate them in the future. Metal shelving has replaced old wood shelving in two rooms, and existing shelving has been thoroughly cleaned. A large-scale inventory has also been completed of all of the boxed clothing in the museum's collection.

Recently, Sara and Vicki, with help from volunteers finished installing metal shelving in the Newspaper/Reference Room. This metal shelving replaced older existing shelving and provided space for over 250 bound newspaper volumes (the oldest dating back to Fort Winnebago's "River Times" in the 1840s!!) to be

in one room, organized by publication and year. Two large map cabinets were also added to this room for storage of blueprints, posters, and other large documents.

Smaller scale organizing will be ongoing in the collections spaces, with continued efforts focussed on item specific record and location updating. This detailed process will further help enhance the accessibility and overall inventory of the collection.

When we're not in the basement organizing or working on other projects, museum staff have been building relationships with other historical societies locally and state wide. In October, museum staff attended the Wisconsin Historical Society's Local History and Historic Preservation Conference held at Ho-Chunk Gaming in Baraboo. At the conference, staff learned new skills, shared ideas, and networked with local history representatives from across the state. This conference was the largest in the 19 years of the conference, with over 400 people attending.

Upcoming, several museum staff will be visiting the Driftless Historium & Mount Horeb Area Historical Society in Mount Horeb. This is a chance for us to reconnect with their Executive Director, Destinee Udelhoven, who used to work in Portage and Baraboo museums. Through this meeting we will share tips and tricks and continue to foster that connection.

Even though the museum is now closed for the season, work will be continuing throughout the winter! Stay warm and we hope to see you all when the museum reopens in the spring.
